A Few Friendly Reminders

First off, for the majority of students and their families, these reminders may seem obvious, but with new families arriving each year, it is always good to provide these reminders:

2nd Term Learning Updates

In very short order, you will be receiving your child's 2nd Term Learning Update. We hope you take the time to review it with your child and talk with them about their goals and whether they need to "stay the course" or adjust them. Some academic goals, such as to improve **reading comprehension**, are well worth an entire year's dedication. Other goals may have been achieved, so take the time to celebrate those successes, and then consider what next steps would be a reasonable challenge to take on. Many of our students have been introduced to the idea of S.M.A.R.T goals, so when thinking about next steps consider that acronym. Are the goals:

Specific: The goal needs to be clear and easy to understand. For example, I would like to increase my reading fluency.

Measurable: The goal needs to have a way to measure progress. I will improve my timed reading by 25-30 words.

Achievable: The goal needs to be realistic.

Relevant: The goal makes sense and fits the purpose. If I want to improve my literacy skills, my goal should address specific aspects of reading and writing.

Timely: The goal must be given a reasonable deadline. For example, in two months, in a timed reading, I will achieve my goal. After that result, I will reassess my goal.

You are not alone in this, so please feel free to have conversations with your child's teacher to seek their input.
